

Strolling Prisoner Recaptured Quickly

ROME — A Rome Police Department prisoner took a brief walk from the justice building to freedom yesterday. He was picked up about two hours later near the Thruway by State Police.

Vernon Eugene Robinson, 20, of Ontario, Calif., appeared in City Court before Special Judge James P. Kehoe Jr. on charges of possession of a dangerous weapon. After his case was adjourned until Sept. 17, he walked unnoticed from the detention room, police said.

The escape took place between 10:15 and 11:30 a.m. according to police. Robinson was apprehended by Trooper P. D. Lacatta about 1:30 p.m. while walking along Route 233 towards the Westmoreland Thruway interchange.

Robinson was arrested on Sept. 4 when his cousin, Dale Robinson of Chickasha, Okla., claimed that he had threatened him with a .22-caliber revolver near the Western Union Office on N. James Street.

Parolmen Dennis Carpenter and Archangelo Reclun said that Robinson admitted owning the weapon but without possession of a license.

Robinson was returned by Rome Police to the Oneida County Jail. He will appear in City Court again Monday, this time on further charges of escaping, second-degree.

Town Board Plans Meeting To Discuss Zoning Changes

CLAYVILLE — The Paris Town Board will meet Oct. 9 with the town Board of Appeals and Russell Bailey planning consultants to discuss possible changes in the town's zoning ordinance.

Supervisor Ralph Morgan said at last night's town board meeting that the proposed new ordinance contains "eight or nine" changes from the present ordinance, including a new fee schedule for building permits, certificates of occupancy, and applications for variances. The October meeting is mainly to acquaint board members with the proposed changes.

The board last night voted to install mercury lights in the Paris Hill light district, at the request of residents, who submitted a petition to the board.

Town Justice Francis Griffin proposed that the board investigate the contents of the town clerk's office.

The board approved the purchase of a new dry copies from Arlott Duplicator and Supply Co. for use in the town clerk and town justice offices.

Supervisor Morgan reported that 13 home and 9 trailer permits were issued last month.

THE BOARD is studying the possibility of installing "no parking" signs on sections of Pinnacle Road and Mohawk Street, at their intersection in Sauquoit. Residents have complained of a traffic problem there when auctions are held in a local auction house.
